


PENNSYLVANIA VITICULTURE AREA

POURING AT THE CENTER OF IT ALL

In the Happy Valley Pennsylvania Viticulture Area (PVA), wine is less about formality and more about fun. Set in the rolling hills of Happy Valley, it's a wine region with personality that is part scenic hideaway, part social hangout. It's shaped as much by its students and young professionals as by its south-facing slopes and steady mountain winds.

Grapes don't have it easy here. Winters bite, temperatures dip below -10°F in the winter, and only the toughest survive, so cold-hardy hybrids like Seyval Blanc, Cayuga White, Valvin Muscat, Geisenheim, and Itasca steal the spotlight.

With approximately 20 acres of vines in the area, estate-grown fruit is both uncommon and cherished. These small, local vineyards feel like hidden gems nestled into the hillsides, offering a sense of discovery and distinct character.

But what the region lacks in acreage, it makes up for in charm. Higher elevations escape early frosts, breezes keep the vines clean, and long summer daylight sets the stage for bright, refreshing wines, perfect for picnic tables, tailgates, impromptu tastings, and sunset hangs.
